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WTC REDESIGN - TOO MUCH FORTRESS, NOT ENOUGH BEAUTY

Tribune architecture critic Blair Kamin says the latest proposal for the WTC site has dignity but fails to synthesize armor and aesthetics. Great skyscrapers, especially in this city of party-hat towers, meet the sky and the ground with unforgettable aesthetic flourish. But the redesigned Freedom Tower at ground zero, which likely will be the nation's tallest skyscraper and surely will be its most heavily fortified, falls short of the towering standard set by the exuberant Chrysler Building and its more dignified skyline partner, the Empire State Building.

WTC 3-YEAR NIST INVESTIGATION - FINAL REPORT

After a three-year study of the collapse of the World Trade Center, the National Institute of Standards and Technology has released their recommendations for major changes in the planning, construction and operation of skyscrapers. http://wtc.nist.gov/

Industry groups are joining forces to review recommendations for changes to structural and life-safety systems for tall buildings proposed by the National Institute of Standards and Technology as part of its\$16-million World Trade Center Investigation. The recommendations, released June 23 for public comment, will form the basis of a debate on how future tall buildings will be designed and constructed and how building codes may evolve.

NEW TALLEST TOWER IN CITY OF LONDON?

A planning application is in for KPF's Bishopsgate Tower. The City of London's ever-changing skyline is set to be transformed again. Plans for the tallest building yet have been submitted to the Corporation of London for approval. At 1,008ft, the Bishopsgate Tower would dwarf the former NatWest skyscraper, the 600ft Tower 42 - currently the City's tallest - and would be only eight feet smaller than the London Bridge Tower, or "Shard of Glass", which has received planning permission from Southwark council. The skyscraper would rise above the neighbouring Leadenhall Building, a 737ft, wedgeshaped structure designed by international architect Richard Rogers, which has also been approved. http://tinyurl.com/9w92w

The 63 storey tower, nicknamed the 'spiral' by those workingon it, was designed after previous architects Murphy Jahn leftfollowing criticism of their work.

INCREASING URBANISATION IN CHINA

China's architectural landscape has the potential to change more over the next two decades than it did during two millennia of imperial rule, says urban research body the Dynamic City Foundation. Around 38% of the country's 1.3 billion population now live in cities, but this number is likely to at least double, or triple, by 2020. China has to build 'an entirely new country in terms of urban living space' according to one architectural observer, while leading Chinese designers lament the current trend for facadism. 'For the overwhelming majority of Chinese architects, form is only a facade to be pasted onto a building that functions - and as quickly as possible...'

Rem Koolhaas predicts southern cities will form a megalopolis over the next 15 years, created by 'Chinese architects who design the largest volume in the shortest time for the lowest fee - an efficiency 2,500 times that of an American architect...' The building boom has produced architects 'who use laptops to quickly cut and paste buildings into existence - some in only two days...'

The World generally is becoming increasingly urbanised. By 2050, nearly 80% of the earth's population will live in cities. Yet if farming practice remains unchanged, the world will need an agricultural land area bigger than Brazil to feed itself. One solution could be urban 'skyscraper farms'. Architects are now proposing concept schemes to 'green up' city centres, create more carbon dioxide conversion in polluted areas and 'repair ecosystems that have been sacrificed by decades of industrial horizontal farming...'
